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TWO ADDED TO MUSIC DEPARTMENT

The music program of the Humanities Division for next year is being strengthened and broadened by the addition of two new faculty members, Mr. Jacques Abram and Miss Patricia Stenberg.

Jacques Abram will participate in the basic Humanities course, giving some lectures, chiefly on the history of music. He will come one day every other week throughout the whole year. He has also agreed to take on a maximum of four private pupils. During the year he will probably give about two concerts. He is also giving the opening concert of the music workshop being held July 12-18.

Mr. Abram, one of the country's foremost pianists, decided upon his career at the age of five. He studied at the Curtis Institute and the Juilliard School of Music. At 21 he won two major national prizes and at 23 made a formal debut as soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra in Philadelphia and New York. He has since performed with more than 75 major orchestras in North and South America and in Europe, and has appeared on all American networks and on broadcasts and telecasts in Canada, England, Denmark, Holland, and Germany.

Miss Patricia Stenberg is gaining wide acclaim as one of the country's foremost young oboists. She performs regularly on the oboe and recorder throughout Florida and served as 1964 chairman for the Florida Music Teachers Association Wind and Percussion division. She

BAUGHMAN TO HEAD NEW COLLEGE FOUNDATION

Ford may have created the largest, but New College has undoubtedly established the newest of the nation's over 5200 foundations.

President Baughman made the somewhat surprising announcement at an all-college meeting yesterday afternoon, May 13. This meeting unlike most of its predecessors, was short and to the point. Yet it delineated a meaningful step in the growth of New College--a step which had been positively undertaken a few hours earlier, when President Baughman presented his suggestion to the Board of Trustees. "The time has come," he stated, "for the activation of the New College Foundation. This foundation would have only one purpose, the support of New College in every way known to modern business and to modern philanthropy. It would hold and enhance the assets of the college, manage them efficiently, seek new sources of support for the college."

Addressing the student body and full faculty for the first time Mr. Louis LaMotte (chairman of the Board) declared that Dr. Baughman's "interesting and very forward-looking proposal to the Board...was unanimously adopted and approved." Dr. Baughman also expressed his desire "to serve as the founding president of the New College Foundation." as he has served as founding president of the college itself. is principal oboist in three major Florida orchestras; the Tampa Philharmonic, the St. Petersburg Symphony and the Florida West Coast Symphony. Miss Stenberg received her Bachelor of Music and her Master of Music from the University of Michigan where she was a student of Florian Nueller, the former principal oboist with the Chicago Symphony. For the past year she has studied with Robert Boom of the Bach Aria Group. From 1957 to 1959 she was a member of the music faculty at the University of Florida at Gainesville.

At New College, Miss Stenberg will be giving lectures and demonstrations on the woodwinds. Incidentally, there is no requirement that all students learn to play the recorder. Rather the opportunity will be made available to all interested.

Mr. Paul Wolfe will remain as Adjunct Professor of Music.

EDUCATIONAL POLICIES COMMITTEE MEETS

At the Educational Policies Committee meeting of the Board of Trustees, Tuesday, May 12, the following actions were discussed:

1. Reaffirming of the Statement of Philosophy of the College (drawn up in 1961.)
2. Discussed medical and health program of the College.
3. New faculty members being invited for next year. Many have offered their assistance in helping to find people for the faculty.
4. Reviewed work on curriculum which had been done by faculty.

An Olympic-size pool has been donated to New College, it was announced recently by President Baughman.

The L-shaped pool will have the regular 25 meter length and the shorter side of the L for diving. There will also be an area for spectators. The pool, which will be located back of the B2 court, is expected to be finished in eight to ten weeks. Possibly the work could begin in the next two weeks.

Also given by the same donors, who wish for the time to remain anonymous, are two lighted tennis courts.

A second anonymous donor has given the money for the landscaping of the entire grounds of the East Campus.

GRANTS FOR EQUIPMENT RECEIVED

New College has just received three equipment grants totaling \$24,000 from the National Science Foundation. These grants, depending on the project director, will be spent on scientific equipment in physics, chemistry, and biology.

For physics, under Dr. Sayvatz, there is a \$9,700 grant; \$8,200 will be under the direction of Dr. Evans; and \$6,700 will be used under the direction of Dr. Kraemer.

Barracks to be Remodeled as Classrooms

On the East Campus, all three of the dorm courts are to be landscaped in such a way that each one of them will be unique. In addition, many of the barrack buildings on the 13 acres on the East Campus are to be remodeled. These will be used as classrooms until the next phase of the East Campus is finished.

for the immediate future as president of New College in addition to his new function as president of the New College Foundation, this major step will necessitate the eventual selection of a new college president, since the responsibilities of both positions would be too great for any one person to handle.

Establishment of a foundation is a momentous step in the growth of a college, especially for a college that has been in operation only a little over seven months, at times seemingly none too stable, and with a total student body that numbers less than one hundred. However, Dr. Baughman appeared to feel that the early establishment of such a foundation is only another illustration of the fact that "this is no ordinary college". And certainly, under Dr. Baughman's leadership, the New College Foundation will be no ordinary foundation.

Day-to-day financing of college activities will definitely not fall under the duties of the foundation. Instead, the foundation will devote its efforts to achieving long-range goals, attracting or developing new sources of support, and maximizing the potential of such activities as a college press or college-related business enterprises.

Both Mr. LaMotte and Dean Eurich praised Dr. Baughman's capable handling of what Mr. LaMotte referred to as "an impossible job".

The particular pattern of structure and method of functioning of the foundation were not discussed at the meeting, but Dr. Eurich commented that as Dr. Baughman outlined it, the office of the president will be in

"direct relationship and close cooperation with the foundation."

Dr. Eurich also urged the complete and dedicated cooperation of both students and faculty in the coming term.

President Baughman recommended that Dean Eurich continue as academic coordinator. In addition she has recently accepted a position as chairman of the educational policy committee.

President Baughman also briefly summarized some of the progress New College has made--in the completion of dorms and the initiation of the next building phase, additional gifts for the construction of the million-dollar complex on the East Campus, and the quality of the 80 students accepted so far for next year's class, already from 36 states, as far away as Hawaii. President Baughman's message received a standing ovation from the group.

The meeting concluded on an optimistic note--perhaps a wordless demonstration of the enthusiasm and loyalty prescribed by Mr. LaMotte and felt so sincerely by most of those who have had a part, however small, in making New College what it is and what it will become.

Sumner Emerson was re-elected Chairman of the Executive Board. Treasurer of the board is Benton Powell and secretary, Robert Van Skike. The resignation of George W. Skilton was tendered and accepted.

This meeting of the entire board has seen discussion of the over-all New College picture. Discussion and review of the academic program and faculty, consideration of an academic dean, and planning of the capital raising program were primary on the agenda.

STATEMENT BY MR. LOUIS LA MOTTE

The President of New College today presented to his Board of Trustees, gathered for their annual meeting, a plan to help insure the continued orderly growth of New College. This plan recognizes the urgent need for resources by all educational institutions, the increasingly difficult task of supplying and managing such resources, and also the necessity for long-range planning by all institutions.

With the same foresight that he has applied to helping to build the college to its present situation, President Baughman has recommended to the Board of Trustees the activation of the New College Foundation, which was created several years ago in anticipation of meeting these needs.

Many colleges and universities have turned to this operational device as a means of strengthening their institutions, but few have done so at this early stage.

The Board feels that this is a significant step in assuring the building of the college toward the goals that have long been established.

The board acted with great enthusiasm on the President's suggestion and unanimously elected him Founding President of the New College Foundation. Board members are of the opinion that President Baughman is the ideal person for this position, and they are delighted that he has accepted the rather awesome responsibilities that go with it. President Baughman therefore is, as of today, both the President of New College and of the New College Foundation.

And now I would like to ask President Baughman to present his plan to you, just as he did to the Board this morning.

STATEMENT BY PRESIDENT BAUGHMAN

We are meeting today on the campus of a viable, dynamic college. Classes are in session. Teachers are teaching; students are studying. And trustees are evaluating, looking back over the past year and looking forward to the next.

Our construction program is well along. Students are living on-campus, living in a magnificent structure designed by one of the world's great architects who is already at work on the next phase of our building program. The selection of our second class, which will enter New College next fall, is nearing completion. It will be of the same high caliber as our charter class.

All of these are things which some people firmly believed and loudly said would never come to pass. But they have. New College is. It is operating.

Now, as we gather to consider the college and its future, there is a matter of great import that I wish to bring to your attention.

It is something that will be new for us, but which has been done by many fine colleges with the same high standards and ideals as our own. It is something which will not only go far to establish the financial security of New College but which, more important, can open new vistas and offer new opportunity.

It is not only efficient. It is challenging.

I have given much thought to this matter. I have considered what other colleges have done, and I have arrived at this conclusion:

The time has come for the activation of the New College Foundation.

This foundation would have only one purpose, the support of New College in every way known to modern business and to modern philanthropy. It would hold and enhance the assets of the college, manage them efficiently, seek new sources of support for the college.

I speak from experience when I say that this arrangement, or one similar to it, is essential to expand the future of the college. New College has been born. It now faces the many and complex problems of growth. It is simply not in the cards that one man or one group of men will be able effectively to supervise the day-to-day operation of the college and also to build and protect its future.

Through the New College Foundation we could assure that the academic effort of the college would not be diluted. We could utilize new people, new resources, new ideas.

This is a bold approach for a college of our size. But this is no ordinary college. We have taken Gargantuan steps in a very short period of time. Our goals are such that they require a much broader base of support than we have yet achieved or than we are likely to achieve without imagination and dedication of the type that can come from a foundation such as I am proposing.

Already the college has been given substantial resources that could be developed if we had the proper organization.

I will not attempt to detail all the possible endeavors of the New College Foundation. But, it could provide us great flexibility for taking advantage of opportunities in the administration and enhancement of our properties, gifts, and endowment; for developing new sources of support; for maximizing the potential of such quasi-academic functions as a college press, college-related business enterprises and other community projects.

I will point out, too, that the foundation would not be responsible for the day-to-day financing of college activities. This would remain, as it should, an operational function, with the foundation free to devote its efforts to the long-range goals of which it is so easy to lose sight in the day-to-day hurly-burly of campus activities and meeting payrolls.

I could expand these remarks at much greater length. But I am sure that most of the members of the Board of Trustees are familiar with the reasoning behind them and with the experience of other colleges and universities which have established similar foundations.

I will only say that as long as a year ago I was sufficiently concerned about this matter to set up the legal framework of such a foundation and it is now incorporated and awaiting the breath of life.

I now urgently recommend to the board that the New College Foundation be activated and that it start operations immediately.

There is one further point.

I have been privileged to be the founding President of New College. I have helped to raise the money, seek out the faculty, select the students, build the buildings. I have labored to bring this college into being and it has been one of the most exciting and rewarding experiences of my life.

Now the college has been born. And, like the proud father that I am, I want to secure its future. I want to help make sure that what we have started will go on and on-- in the next year, the next decade, the next century.

I believe that a major instrument to achieve that goal will be the New College Foundation, and I would be honored and pleased if this board should see fit to allow me to serve as the Founding President of the New College Foundation.

I realize that this would mean you would be faced with the task of selecting a new President

for the college. And also that it might be in order to formalize a division of the responsibilities of the President of the college and the President of the foundation.

But I see here no insurmountable problems, only opportunities. I recommend that Dr. Eurich continue as academic coordinator until the appropriate, outstanding person can be secured as President of the college.

Let me say this in closing: For myself, I can conceive of no more useful and important contribution that I might make at this crucial stage in the college's journey to the greatness it is destined to achieve than the cultivation of the resources that will nurture and sustain it.

DR. EURICH'S STATEMENT

I want personally and speaking for you to express our appreciation to Mr. Baughman. I think once again he's come forth with a solution to a problem which is brilliant. I think without the additional resources and time and energy put into a program of the foundation, this college could not achieve its greatness. In only 5 weeks of observing the tasks of the office of President, it is most apparent that no one human being can bear that burden. We've tried to assist in the academic program of the college; we've not been able to help to any great extent yet in the financial area. We intend to assist in every possible way to

make this very successful. As assets of the college are turned over to the foundation we will in turn seek funds through the office of the President of the college, which will be in direct relationship and close connection with the foundation as Dr. Baughman has outlined it. I believe that we're not too unusual as Mr. Baughman has pointed out except in the fact that we've found it necessary to do this earlier than most institutions have. I think in this period of growth we need it, as we've never needed anything so badly. I think when we get 2 or 3 people going in this area we shall achieve the goal that we've set in a more rapid fashion.

I ask you for only one thing: we are looking for an outstanding president to assist Mr. Baughman as president of the foundation. In the meantime I think the faculty can do a great deal to assist us by performing in a way that is higher than anyone has ever dreamed. And I ask the students to accept a responsibility in this interim period and to do the very best job they're capable of doing. We need this assistance at this time and I think we'll finish this first academic year of the institution with very flying colors indeed.

Minutes from the Multi-Purpose Committee Meeting of May 12, 1965

The Committee discussed and amended a proposed outline of disciplinary action which was suggested by the Faculty Discipline Committee. The revised document is republished here:

1. Any member of the student body or college community as a whole who sees a student violating a rule of the college is expected to speak to the student. This is a reminder.

2. On the second infringement, a formal warning is to be given the student by the Multi-Purpose Committee. The committee as a whole should speak to the student, either going to him or calling him before their committee. This warning should be accompanied by a written notice.

3. A further infringement would mean that the Multi-Purpose Committee refers to the Dean of Students' office with recommendations for appropriate action. The Dean will issue a final warning, speak to the student and have the powers of probation at his disposal. The probation should be for a specified length of time and any such action taken should be a matter of record both for the Faculty Discipline Committee, the Multi-Purpose Committee, and the student. Also the Academic Dean should be so notified when any student is placed on probation by the Dean of Students.

4. Failure on the part of the student to live up to the terms of the probation should mean referral to the Faculty Discipline Committee, which committee holds the powers of suspension and expulsion from the school. If either is proposed by

the Faculty Discipline Committee, three students are to be selected at random by the Dean of Students to meet with the Faculty Committee. These students are not to be members of the Multi-Purpose Committee or any official group that has considered the case earlier. The students are to be considered on equal status with the faculty in consideration of the case.

5. Appeal can be made to the person(s) who took the final action.

Notification to parents should come only from the Academic Dean's office and should be decided on the basis of individual cases.

A suggestion on the handling of problems of student behavior in the early stages, before it is necessary to begin the ladder of disciplinary measures, was offered by Drs. Kraemer and Long:

Sometimes student behavior involves lack of consideration for others without actually violating any of the specific items listed in the code of conduct. Repeated admonitions by students do not change the pattern of behavior and none of it seems serious enough to warrant probation or the threat of probation.

When explicit rules are violated, students themselves, whether or not they are members of the Multi-Purpose Committee, usually want to have the first responsibility (step 1 in Mrs. Eurich's summary of 4 May 1965). Sometimes, however, students are ineffective either because the admonitions are ignored or because they are resented. In that event, faculty could be consulted informally, in an attempt to prevent the situation from developing to the point of starting a student on the

disciplinary ladder (steps 2-4 in Mrs. Eurich's summary).

In instances of either kind --with or without actual violation of rules--the role of a faculty member could be that of an advisor, to help students to put the situation in perspective, to identify the problem, and to attempt to find a realistic solution. Discussion would avoid any aura of crime and punishment but rather begin with a recognition of differing views and of the need to reconcile these views in order to maintain a stable community. (Discussion of this kind might be as profitable for the complaining student as for the one complained of.)

The particular faculty member to be involved would depend on the problem; students are usually aware of who is willing and able to help in a given situation. If the professor consulted decides another might be more useful, students can be referred to him.

If, while discussion is continuing, the situation becomes sufficiently grave in the professor's judgment to warrant a report, he does so report to the Multi-Purpose Committee.

There is really nothing new about this suggestion. We are only reminding faculty and students that they together, as individuals, may be able to cope with some social problems, in an informal and unstructured manner.
