COMMITTEE OF FIVE
PRESENTS QUESTIONNAIRE

The second class meeting in three days was called for Wednesday evening. A sense of relative order and accomplishment prevailed during the short meeting as chairman Richard Waller presented and dispensed with the four points of business.

First there was a two page student questionnaire dealing with intervisitation and the enforcement of rules that was answered by students present to obtain opinion.

Next there was an announcement that due to illness Karen Fryklund, a member of the "committee of five", had to resign. It was suggested that one of the original candidates, Anna Navarro, take her place. Previously, a majority of the students had accepted such a proposal in writing so

The Young and the Damned

Sunday night, the 28th of March, the film "The Young and the Damned", will be shown in the Music Room.

In my opinion, the director of this film, Bunuel, has an unexplainable sense of tenderness and feeling. His work finds expression in violence, in a savage exploration and condemnation of convention, and a pitiless attack on human egoism. Above all, Bunuel's world is erotic, illustrating the disruptive forces that play in the human psyche.

"The Young and the Damned" is a horror stricken cry of love and terror, an examination of the lives of poor abandoned children. This is a slashing account of human degradation through poverty. Herein is no elevation through suffering, rather a revelation of human viciousness, swelling in its amplitude and resonance.

Bunuel's work is set in the social context of man. He never loses sight of the egoism of the moneyed classes and the moral degradation of the poor.

Bunuel is an anarchist, disturbing and chaotic. His work is unbalanced because Bunuel is his own victim, and allows too little distance between himself and his creation.

This film is a masterpiece that deeply touches the heart of any human person.
