EAST CAMPUS DINING AREA DRAWINGS RELEASED

The drawings of the dining area for New College have been completed, it was learned in an interview with Captain Ralph Styles, Campus planning officer. Mr. Sheldon Peed, an associate of I.M. Pei, presented them last week. The plans include a covered walkway 400 feet long from the housing units, a lobby with several offices and a switchboard, a snack bar, a court-like lounge with a skylight, three private dining rooms with removable partitions, and a President's Dining Room. The Kitchen area shown in the plans calls for a pantry area used for the scramble cafeteria when needed and a food pick-up station for regular served meals. Near the kitchen will be a laundry room for linen pick-up and for coin operated washers and dryers and other vending machines. There will be one large lecture room, four classrooms and a lab room in this building. Bids for construction will go out in mid-May and the building will begin in late May.

FIRST TWELVE ROOMS TO BE FINISHED MARCH 8

According to Claude Schutter, project inspector at the dorm construction, twelve rooms will be finished by March 8. Six of these rooms will be on the first floor and the other six on the second. Most of these rooms have some tiling done and some are ready for painting. The paint will be an off white in all the rooms, the variation in decor coming in the drapes and carpeting. The tiling is all of a brownish shade. Each room is slightly different from the others in that one room has two paties, another has a fountain right outside the windows, another is more separated from the rest. Each room will be furnished with two beds, two combination dresser-desks, two desk chairs, a lounge chair, a floorlamp, and a bookcase. There is ample closet space and each room has its own thermostat. The rest of the rooms will be finished within two to three weeks after the first twelve.
